advised that Charles Ream on April 18, 1969 that there will be a demonstration at the Commencement Exercises at WMU on April 19, 1969. Ream stated that the demonstrators will use a "bullhorn" and have tables set up for the purpose of handing out literature to persons attending the Commencement. The source advised that Governor William Milliken of Michigan is the principal speaker at the Commencement Exercises, and Ream indicated that the demonstration would be a form of protest to Milliken having ordered Michigan State Police intervention at demonstrations at Ferris State University, Big Rapids, Michigan and at WMU.

Ream was listed as graduating summa cum laude in the program of the WMU Commencement Exercises on April 19, 1969, but Ream was unable to receive his degree because he had incompletes in several courses.

Later, on April 19, 1969, source four advised that there was no demonstration at the WMU Commencement Exercises that day, and there was no indication of any attempt to demonstrate by anyone. Ream was present at the Commencement Exercises as a spectator.

On May 15, 1969, , advised that Charles D. Ream applied for admission to WMU in February, 1965, at which time he was living at 22 Stephens Street, North Balwyn, Australia. He indicated that he was born on November 19, 1946 at Three Rivers, Michigan. The school last attended by Ream was listed as Scotch College, Melbourne, Australia, and he graduated from that school in 1964. Ream entered WMU as a freshmen in the General Curriculum course and he was admitted to the Honors College. Ream listed the North Balwyn, Australia address when he entered WMU, but he also listed a previous address of 15634 O'Connor, Allen Park, Michigan. He listed his parents as Walter and Janet Ream, 506 Mechanic Street, Three Rivers, Michigan. His father graduated from the University of Michigan (U of M), and his mother attended WMU but did not graduate. He listed his father's occupation as Vice President for Product Planning for the Ford Motor Company. Ream received very high grades, and he received all A's during the fall semester of 1968. His over-all average is 3.90 out of a possible 4.00.

Second Seconds

The program for the April 19, 1969 Commencement Exercises at WMU listed Ream as graduating summa cum laude; however, on April 18, 1969 Ream advised that he would be unable to graduate because he had incompletes in several courses. Ream also stated that his parents were flying in from Latin America to attend the Commencement Exercises. Ream's parents have been living in Latin America and Ream flew to Latin America to visit his parents over Christmas, 1968.

stated that Ream will still graduate summa cum laude if and when he completes the courses taken during the winter semester ending April 18, 1969. Ream is not enrolled in the spring semester at WMU which began on April 28, 1969.

Ream has stated that he wants to start work on a doctorate to prepare himself to be president of a university "so things can be run as they should." He has stated that if he cannot be hired, he will start his own university.

Ream was the recipient of the \$1,000 Dwight B. Waldo and Paul V. Sangren Scholarship Award at WMU. He was offered but refused an undergraduate assistantship in the Honors College worth \$1,200.

that he participated in the riots at the Democratic Convention in Chicago, Illinois during August, 1968, and he struck two policemen with objects in Washington, D.C. during the weekend of the Presidential Inauguration in January, 1969. Ream stated that these acts were his contribution to bring about his kind of world

advised that Ream was one of the leaders and spokesmen for a group of students who met with WMU President James W. Miller on March 24, 1969 and presented demands for increased student rights and power.

Re: Charles David Ream

On Tuesday night, April 1, 1969, a large group of students staged a "stay-in" in the Snack Bar in the University Student Center as a protest to a proposed hike in tuition and in furtherance of their demand for increased rights for students by permitting the students to have as much voice as the faculty in administrative matters. Shortly after 11:00 p.m. that night WMU Vice President Paul L. Griffeth announced to the group in the Snack Bar that they were guilty of unlawful assembly and they would be given 15 minutes to leave the building or be subject to arrest. Many of the students remained in the building until approximately 2:00 a.m., at which time they learned that police were on their way to the campus.

identified Ream as one of the students who remained in the Snack Bar after the announcement made by Vice President Griffeth. Ream was ordered to appear before the Men's Disciplinary Board at WMU on April 16, 1969 to answer the charge that he failed to obey an administrative order to vacate the premises. Ream appeared before that board on the day designated. Ream claimed that he was in the rest room when Vice President Griffeth made the announcement and he did not hear the announcement. Ream had several students with him who apparently were prepared to testify to his having been absent when Vice President Griffeth made the announcement to vacate the Student Center. Ream did admit that he was told about Griffeth's announcement and he remained in the Snack Ear after learning of the announcement. The Men's Disciplinary Board issued a "warning" to Ream.
