Generally decided to run in all Wards during the primary with concentrated efforts in Wards 1, 2, and 4. Run Wards 3 and 5 as educational elections only. MARGO NICHOLS, w/f, Dob: 10/6/43% is one candidate, possibly MIKE DOVER, w/m, Dob: 9/10/48, and a bunch of other "maybe's". Disbanded for 1/2 hour to collect signatures on petitions at movie lines. PETITION DRIVES OVER THE TOP! SEBTS LIKELY

Six months of research, organizing, and sweat came to a climax Monday, December 31st when the Human Rights Party turned in Charter Amendment petitions to the City Clerk. Over 6000 registered voters signed the petition calling for the reinstatement of the five dollar marijuana fine and 6500 signed the rent control petition.

We now await the decision of the City Clerk as to whether the necessary 3670 valid registered voter signatures have been garnered to get the proposals on the ballot. This is not a foregone conclusion, since many people apparently think that illegible signatures are a mark of distinction. If the necessary names have been gathered, the amendments will be sent to Lansing. Governor Milliken will then have the opportunity to express

his cutrage, but his disapproval (which we expect) has no legal force. Attorney General Kelley must also approve the wording of the ballot question so that it is not deceptive.

In the mean time, the real work beginscampaigning for the support of Ann Arbor
voters. The outlook is hopeful, considering the terrific and totally unprecedented
response to the petition drives. But
16,000 votes (at least) will be needed to
pass the proposals. In any event, both
issues will provide opportunities to organize people on an unprecedented scale.
Win or lose, we have already gone far to
raise the consciousness of thousands of
people.

Unfortunately, the pay for City Council proposal had to be temporarily (continued page 2)

vice president of Keyes Realty until 1971. Keyes Realty, a Miami business with underworld connections (the IRS in 1948 suspected that the funds used by the firm to purchase large tracks of Key Biscayne land had belonged to "Luciano and other underworld characters"), has helped both Rebozo

and Nixon in various land deals at bargain rates.

So it would seem that the chain leading from crime to cover-up to new crime has occured over decades and administrations, and it has become a major preoccupation of the man who still sits in the

White House.

The crimes of our present and past presidential leaders cover the globe as well as the decades. These crimes are committed to protect the foreign investments of U.S. corporations. In Cuba, increasingly in Panama, in Vietnam and much of oil-rich Southeast Asia, and in Chile our government has overtly or covertly involved itself militarily under the guise of Protecting freedom-loving countries from Communism -- but only after it became obvious that U.S. exploditation of raw materials and labor would not be tolerated by popular governments. While professing to support the traditional American ideals of freedom, dignity, and justice for all, our government has inflicted great pain and injustice on peoples abroad and at home. It was perhaps inevitable that such practices would be brought to play in the election of the president of the U.S. as in the Watergate conspiracy.

Impeaching Nixon for his actions won't bring about freedom, dignity and justice. It will likely only bring us Gerald Ford and flunkey promises of "better government." The impeachment movement will, however, educate people in the ways of organizing outside the two "major" parties to demand redress of grievances from a government that is literally out of control.

companies who own the majority of uranium deposits just fine, but posing a serious unresolved problem of transportation and disposal of redicactive nuclear wastes. Nixon has, in fact, already decided to turn the control of storic power plant emission standards to the Atomic Energy Commission, rather than EPA.

Independent gas dealers, along with the environment, are breathing their last. The major oil companies contend that they are obligated to distribute gas to their own name brand stations first, giving only the excess to the independents. No excess, no independente; no independente, no competition; and at this point, prices can be jacked up as fast as the price per gallon meter can be readjusted.

Finally, having staked out positions in both the coal industry and nuclear power in the 1960's, the oil companies are using the shortage as justification for alternative sources of energy, and higher prices for oil as a means for insuring that that prices for alternative sources of energy will be "competitive" -- that is, they will be able to make the same rip-off profits. The idea is to strip-wine the West, selling the low-sulphur coal to electric utilities and changing the rest into synthetic gas or oil. Although technically possible since the 1930's, the industry has been unwilling to undertake the project until prices for other Quels rose--prefering instead to concentrate its efforts on pressuring the Federal Power Commission to de-regulate the price of natural gap. Repeatedly the oil and gas industry have presented the government with artificially low estimates of reserves, until eventually the price of natural gas was permitted to rise by over 50%. Predictably though, no new supplies of gas were discovered.
