The following was received from a confidential and reliable source of an interview with CHRIS ANDONIAN:

She stated that she had been discontent with the American establishment and felt it all went back to the fact that she was raised in a slum area in Kalamazoo and was discriminated against. She mentioned that she had seen the hypocrisy of the American belief that all people are created equal. She stated that this feeling of discontent is throughout the whole family and her grandfather TARPINIAN is a member of the Communist Party and lives in Chicago. She also has a sister who attends Michigan State University, but is not aggressive enough and is not an organizer. Her ideas became formulated into action several years ago with help of a RAYNELLE SILCOY and a DAVE BOSS (neither are any longer involved in the movement). ANDONIAN stated that she knew ED JACQUES very well and that at one time he was an SDS leader. JACQUES has since become involved in drugs and thinks he is Jesus. He goes around preaching love instead of revolution. JACQUES is presently in the Kalamazoo State Hospital. She named other people who got her started in the revolutionary movement. Mentioned was CHUCK BEAM, who introduced her to MESSER, who encouraged her thinking. She further advised that BEAM is user of LSD and has very good quality drugs. She states that she was turned on with drugs, but she has given them up and has turned her efforts to the revolution. She advised that she knew JON PILAR aka GEMLI and described him as a nut trying to start a commune for love and drugs. PILAR is also in the Kalamazoo State Hospital. She further stated that she used to make frequent trips to Chicago and Grand Rapids to contact people about the High School Liberation Movement. These trips were set up by Peter, Mark and John (PETER CLAPP, MARK LEVEMER and NORRIE KALOM). She advised that the High School Liberation Movement consisted of 10 or 11 students who are really serious about the revolutionary movement. A STEPHANIE STERNS is involved at LOY NORRIS High School. ANDONIAN claims that at one time, herself, RICK DUTIL, STEVE MCGEE, MIKE LANDO and JOHN LEADER had planned to take over Portage Northern High School with the use of Napalm and when the police came they would shoot them. She felt that this was possible because LEADER'S father had access to chemicals. LEADER is no longer involved in the revolutionary movement. ANDONIAN states that RAGER MESSER is of no use to the cause other than getting liberals involved. She believes that MESSER has justification for his beliefs because he was raised in Appalachia. MESSER helped in starting the underground paper 'Jailbreak', but DAVE MOLENAAR and BOB MANNIS are running it. She states that MESSER'S house is a good place to meet with people who are involved in the revolutionary movement. She advises that MESSER is not violent enough and some think he may be called a 'PIG'. MESSER was never a real organizer during the disruptions at Western Michigan University. She claims that the most violent one is LEONARD WAGNER, who once approached her about stoning the Administration Building at Western. ANDONIAN went to the high schools and recruited some students for the stoning of the ad building, but WAGNER failed to show up. MESSER is presently involved in the WHEEL Organization and is trying to involve liberals the minority groups in this organization. She feels that WHEEL will be a big thing on campus this fall and that MESSER will get more liberals involved and violence could possibly occur. MESSER is setting up a printing press in his basement so he can run off a weekly paper. She regards STEVE MCGEE as the one to watch because of his intelligence and dedication to the movement. When asked where the possible targets could be in Kalamazoo she stated that the 1st National Bank and Gilmore's Dept. store would be good targets. MESSER told them that they should not bomb the campus, but should bomb the Downtown Mall and the West Main Mall. A PAT FORDHAM became involved in bringing violence to the Women's Liberation Movement and has advocated breaking windows at the Mall.
